Olmstead

- "The unjustified segregation of people in institutions, when community placement is appropriate, constitutes a form of discrimination prohibited by Title II [of the ADA]."
- Department of Justice enforcement efforts
 - 40 matters in 25 states in recent years
- HHS Office of Civil Rights
 - Complaints
 - Investigations



Nursing Home Transition

- In response to Olmstead, CMS (HCFA) awarded 12 Nursing Facility Transition Grants (NFTG) to states between 1998-2000.
 - Demonstrated that housing was the #1 barrier to transitioning from institutional settings.
 - Began early collaborations between housing and services programs in the context of long-term care

Real Choice Systems Change Grants

- First round in 2004: addressed <u>housing availability</u> as a challenge. The state Medicaid agency grantees awards to establish collaborations with housing agencies:
 - Local Public Housing Agencies' set-asides for persons with disabilities
 - State Housing Finance Agencies' low income housing tax credits projects for persons with disabilities
 - Statewide database on affordable, accessible housing
- Then in 2011 RCSC Housing collaboration focus
 - Medicaid/MFP agencies developing sustainable partnerships with housing agencies, including Sec. 811 applications
 - Creating permanent, affordable, integrated rental housing

Money Follows the Person

- Today 44 states & DC
- Over 40,000 people have transitioned into community living through the MFP program
- 40% are non-elderly, 37% are elderly, 18% are people with intellectual disabilities, 6% are people with mental illness
- Where They Move:
 - 29% move into a home they or a family member own, 41% move into a qualified assisted living facility/group home with 4 or fewer, 30% move into an apartment
- MFP allows admin funding for housing-services staff
 - Those MFP programs with housing staff are most successful in using housing resources like vouchers

Housing Capacity Building Initiative

- HHS/HUD Housing Capacity Building Initiative for Community Living (CBI) TA contract:
 - A landmark project joining Departments of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and Health and Human Services (HHS), under the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS)
 - To assist federal, state and local agencies as well as community partners to create sustainable, collaborative relationships between housing and services agencies



CBI Collaborative Efforts

- HUD & HHS collaborations: Federal Agencies
 & States/Local Grantees
 - Housing Capacity Building TA Contract
 - HUD Non-elderly disabled (NED) Category 2 Housing Choice Vouchers for transitioning from institutions
 - 28 local PHAs with MFP partners
 - HUD Sec. 811 Project Rental Assistance for non-elderly disabled grants
 - 13 state HFAs with MFP/Medicaid partners in 2012
 - 2014 applications currently under review

CBI Collaboration Outcomes

Regional Trainings

- Regions 4 & 6, Dallas, TX March 2012
- Regions 9 & 10, Seattle, WA May 2012

Achievements:

- <u>Texas</u>: 200 rental vouchers and public housing units set aside for MFP, following Dallas Regional Training
- <u>Tennessee</u>: 18 new housing units for MFP from TN Housing Finance Agency, *following Dallas Regional Training*
- <u>California</u>: 335 housing units under HUD Sec. 811 PRA grant with CA HFA, following Seattle Regional Training
- 68 Original Products: Developed by Team to support housing/services collaboration now available at www.MFP-TAC.com
