- Section 307(a) of the Older Americans Act (OAA) requires each state agency to develop a State Plan on Aging
- Section 306 of the OAA indicates that states are also required to develop a uniform format for Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs) for developing Area Plans
- State Plans on Aging required by the OAA, but more than just OAA programs and services







State and Area Plan Reporting Tool 2019-2022


Overview of MN's LTSS




High Performance Characteristics

- Phase 1: AAA Area Plan reporting platform template (MS Excel)
- Phase 2: Migration of AAA Area Plan and State Plan combined reporting tool
 - Now that we have successfully developed and piloted the process in Excel, continuous improvement requires a better platform for user experience and data management
 - Recreate all newly created processes and functionality of Excel tools into single, easy to use Web based tool
 - Better end user experience (easier to use, more control over technology, less technology challenges)
- Phase 3: Roll up regional data into Statewide strategic efforts to generate reports for 4 year State Plan on Aging outcome report

Outcome Reporting Timeline

Currently developing Detailed System Design (DSD) document for Foundant.
 This is a necessary step in software development and will help vendor "translate" our current process and tool into their product.

1st quarter


- Work with Foundant to recreate AAA and State reporting tools and processes in their product
- Iteratively test new tool during Q1
- Gain approval and buy in of new tool

2nd Quarter

- Implement new Foundant reporting tool for AAAs and State in April 2020
- First report in new tool due July 20th 2020

Process Visual

- Integrated report from AASD Division staff into State Plan goals
- Improved analysis of regional work
- Sets the stage for 2022 Area Plan platform
- Periodic updates and reviews
